#### INTRODUCTION

We will compare PSSA scores from the 2018-19 school year with those from 2020-2021. We will use screening tools/programs such as iReady, Reading A-Z, and other diagnostic tools to identify students who are most in need of academic support.

Q1: assess current academic levels and compare with previous benchmark data.End of Q1: identify student greatest academic and social-emotional needs and begin providing intensive tutoring to bridge learning gaps in addition to their regular classroom instruction. Q2 and beyond: review benchmark data and continue providing intensive tutoring for students that continue to show need. End of year: evaluate progress of all students and use data to determine eligibility for summer program. Students with greatest need will be prioritized for summer program, although we hope to offer it to anyone who would like to participate.

We will use ESSER II funds to promote remote learning in the following ways:-Teachers will utilize web-based platforms for instruction.-We will provide additional training to enhance teachers' understanding of and utilization of web-based platforms to promote student engagement/learning. -We will purchase and provide equipment for students (headphones, microphones, Chromebooks) to facilitate learning.-We will remove barriers (lack of connectivity, etc.) by providing hotspots, translation services, equipment as stated above.-We will offer additional web-based educational programs to students.

Assess: We will gather and compare PSSA data from year to year and use data to prioritize students in need of intensive tutoring. We will administer benchmarks throughout the year to determine the support needed. Address: Identified students will receive intensive tutoring, using evidence-based practices, in the identified areas of need during the school year. We will offer summer programs to continue to reduce learning gaps and decrease summer learning loss.
